Parking, Crime, and Partying: A Case Study of Community-University Relations

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BACKGROUND

- Universities increasingly strive to become engaged with the community and to maintain positive community relations (Dempsey 2010).
- Unequal power distributions can impede community-university relationships and partnerships (Peterson 2009).
- Researchers were interested in analyzing the relationship between a mid-size state university and its surrounding rural community.

THE CURRENT STUDY

We collected data on factors contributing positively and negatively to the university-community relationship.

METHODS

Participants

- N = 13 community and university stakeholders
- The following stakeholders were of interest in this study:
- University: Current Students, Student Organization
 Leaders, University Employees, University Administration,
 and University Police Officers.
- Community: Community Residents, Community Religious Leaders, Community Political Leaders, Police Officers, Lawyers, Small Business Owners, News Reporters/Media, and Leasing Officers/Realtors.

Procedure

- Various stakeholders were interviewed on their personal opinions on community-university relations and their recommendations on how to improve the relationship.
- Stakeholders were interviewed with semi-structured protocol and also given the option for the interview to be tape recorded
- A **PhotoVoice** project, conducted by the researchers, supplemented stakeholder interviews. PhotoVoice entails using photography to highlight research themes.

Measures

The following three questions were asked to each stakeholder:

• What kind of relationship does Salisbury University share with the larger Salisbury Community? What kind of relationship should the University have with the broader community?

Follow-up: Do you think that there is a positive or negative relationship

between the University and the broader community?

- Are there any major problems in the current relationship between the University and the Salisbury community?
- What do you think could be done to improve the University's relationship with the community?

Additional questions were asked to specific stakeholders.

DATA ANALYTIC PLAN •Stakeholders' answers were compiled in a cross-case meta-matrix. •A comparative analysis was conducted to identify key themes across stakeholders. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION Problems and Suggestions for Improvement Stakeholders were relatively consistent in their identification of key problems in existing community-university relations. Three factors impeding community-university relations were identified. Stakeholders had numerous suggestions for improving the relationship. Themes are summarized in Figure 1 below. CONCLUSIONS

- Students should feel welcome and safe in their learning environment and community members should benefit from the presence of a University
- Offering stakeholders an opportunity to voice their opinions may lead them to feel more empowered to voice concerns in the future
- Ecological interventions improve not only the ease of mobility around the community, but also the overall appearance
- Improving community-university relations is overall beneficial to the community as a whole and the community will function better if students and local members can cohabitate.
- Improving relationships with the community also facilitates collaborative research partnerships.
